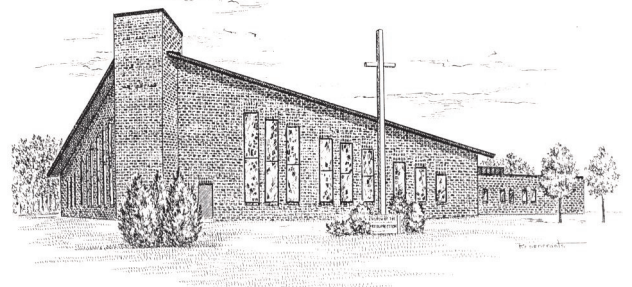
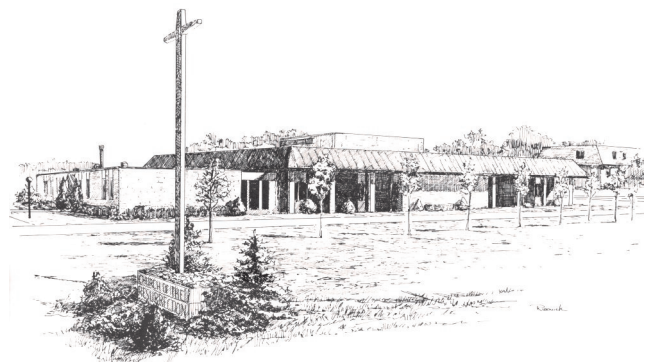

Weekly Words from The Rock

In February 1993, Karl Keating in the periodical This Rock composed a quiz entitled "The World's Toughest Catholic Quiz." Trust me, it is difficult. Over the course of the next weeks we will look at certain questions from the quiz. Last week, I provided two questions for you to think about and see if you could come up with the correct answer. Here are the questions and answers.

Question: A deacon is

- A priest who does not have permission to celebrate Mass until after his wife dies.
- A layman who may distribute Communion, marry people, baptize babies, and wear vestments.
- A man who has received the first level of holy orders and is neither a priest nor a layman.
- Forbidden to hear confessions and give absolution except in emergency situations and in the absence of a priest.
- None of the above.

Answer:

- Wrong, because a deacon is not a married priest. Married priests are called, well, married priests, and they are common in some of the Eastern rites. Although deacons are ordained, they receive only the first level of orders.
- Wrong, because although deacons may do all of these things, they are not laymen. They are clerics, even though they usually don't dress like priests.
- Correct, because a deacon, as a cleric, is no longer a layman but is not yet a priest.
- Wrong, because a deacon never can give priestly absolution, for

the simple reason that he is not a priest.

- Wrong, because c. is correct.

Question: A sister is:

- Neither a lay person nor a cleric.
- A cleric, but no longer a lay person.
- May be installed as a chaplain of a hospital.
- Is the female equivalent of a deacon.
- None of the above.

Answer:

- Wrong, because sisters (women religious), like brothers (men religious), are lay people. They are not ordained – they take vows, which is different.
- Wrong, because sisters are not ordained, and only the ordained are clerics. There are three grades of clerics: deacons, priests, and bishops.
- Wrong, even though in some places sisters are termed chaplains." According to canon law (canon 564), chaplains, properly speaking, are priests. It isn't correct to call someone a chaplain merely because he or she provides some sort of spiritual counseling.
- Wrong, because there are no female deacons. Too, because women cannot be ordained as deacons, priests, or bishops.
- Correct, because all the other possible answers are wrong.

Question: Which of the following is a defined Catholic dogma (a dogma is a truth revealed by God to which people must give assent)?

- Purgatory
- Both purgatory and limbo.
- Priestly celibacy.

without the aid of a human father.

- Mary conceived Jesus immaculately in her womb and he remained without sin.
- Mary was conceived immaculately in her mother's womb without the aid of a human father.
- Mary was conceived immaculately in her mother's womb and was preserved from sin.
- None of the above.

In working through these questions, please take your time. Remember they are tricky, very tricky. We will see how you did next week.

I had hoped to have our 50th Anniversary Church History on display this weekend. Unfortunately, it will not be complete until next week. We will have it ready to go just prior to our 50th Anniversary Celebration. It has been an amazing experience to go back in time to 1967, and relive parish events, Rochester events, and world events as they have unfolded during these past five decades. You realize the impact that the world events have had on personal choices, the opinions you develop, and the ways in which you draw strength from your family and faith.

My family moved from Aberdeen, South Dakota to Rochester in 1968. We lived just south of here, down 11th Avenue in a section of town called,



Southport. There was no Willow Creek Middle School, just open fields. In fact there were no houses between us and 16th Street. Meadow Park was just beginning to explode. My sister and I would ride our bikes to Soldiers Field Swimming Pool cutting across 20th Street, which was a gravel road, to connect with Third Avenue. We would watch remote control

airplanes fly through the air, as the old airport made the perfect landing spot. I attended Pinewood Elementary School, Central High School and Mayo High School, graduating in 1975. Donna and Bill Nolden, my next door neighbors, would allow me to tag along with them on Sundays to attend Mass at Resurrection. I became very involved in Young Life, a Christian youth group, during high school. Mark and I started dating after high school and he was very involved in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Mark was asked by the Resurrection youth minister, Ken Behringer, to help with teaching 9th graders. He convinced me to help, too. I still remember those young men like it was yesterday. In fact, Chris Degnan (Bob and Marsha's son) was just visiting this past month and it was so great to see him again.

With our parents firmly planted in Rochester, even though Mark and I graduated from the University of Wisconsin La Crosse, lived in Wisconsin and Texas before returning to Rochester in 1987, we were regular visitors. So I have been a witness to the city's growth, to the growth of Resurrection parish, and the impact that world events have had on us.

The following numbers are Rochester's population these past 50 years. In 1960, Rochester's census was 40,663 people; in 1970/53,766; in 1980/57,800; in 1990/70,745; in 2000/85,806; and in 2010, Rochester's population was 106,769 people. We have seen tremendous growth. All indications point to continued growth for years to come.

Resurrection has had wonderful pastors and has had a history of strong parishioner involvement from its very beginnings. Who could imagine that for nine years, Resurrection parishioners banded together to pull off bringing a real rodeo to the Olmsted Fair Grounds every summer? Neighborhood groups were the foundation of our parish structure and I truly think this has had a lasting impact that continues to nourish a spirit that is willing to be of service to the parish and community. The effort that it takes to sustain Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration is another telltale sign of our dependence on one another and our commitment to prayer before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. What an incredible feat this has been for the past sixteen years and it is having an incredible impact on lives. We can trust that. Resurrection is on the verge of discovering what *boldly serving others through God's love* can do when we really share who he is. Let's celebrate, but know that God has so much more for us to do.

Enjoy God's embrace.

Liturgy Notes from Joann

Come, Holy Spirit!

This weekend we sing the *Pentecost Sequence* at Mass. A *sequence* is a piece of liturgical poetry that is read or sung as part of the Liturgy of the Word on certain feast days.

A sequence expands on and explains the meaning of the celebration. On Pentecost, the *sequence* is meant to evoke for us an experience of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Here are the words to the *Pentecost Sequence*. Which title describes the action of the Holy Spirit in your life?

*Come, Holy Spirit, come!
 And from your celestial home, Shed a ray of light divine!
 Come, Father of the poor!
 Come, source of all our store! Come, within our bosoms shine.
 You, of comforters the best;

Let the Holy Spirit be our Guide

As our Faith Formation program ends for this year, our faith and prayers continue throughout the summer. Taking a break from book learning and memorization is a necessity during the short summer months. In Minnesota, summer is a time to rejuvenate our spirits with outdoor activities and relaxation. While some find joy in action-packed sports, large family gatherings, early mornings and late evenings, others search for contentment in the quietness of gardening and lawn care, simple projects, and reading. Whatever your family chooses, let it be satisfying to your souls. Last summer, I gave families a list of 101 things to do during the summer, giving them positive options for long days ahead. It was not meant to be a



check list. We know that time seems to slip away when we aren't paying attention. Day after day, our children grow physically, mentally, and spiritually. We spend a lot of time on the physical and the mental parts, but we can all do better with the spiritual part. So this year, maybe we need a better way to focus on how we continue to grow spiritually. Like everything, if you practice, give it energy and time, you will gain understanding and ability.

Parents and grandparents will always be the carriers of the faith for our children. Being spiritual role models is important work. In fact, it is the best, most rewarding work that God has entrusted to us. I remember thinking when my children were born that they were not mine, but that God had entrusted them to me. I know that sounds strange, but I still feel that way today and my youngest child is graduating from high school next weekend. Along the way, I realized that God gave them to me forever, no matter how old all of us grow to be. My spiritual work is endless and raising children is never-ending. I must continually be revising, adjusting, fine tuning, learning, and adapting my own prayers and include more space for God to be able to help my own children and the children of others.

I've had many discussions with parents who don't know where to start. I suggest you begin at the beginning, or wherever you and your family are today. Stop doing what you've always done and start doing more of what God wants you to do.

Do first things, first. Ask God for His help in leading you and your family to the activities, events, and family time that is in His will. Tell him about your struggles with too little time, too much work, and not enough energy, money or patience. Then, tell Him that you will listen for Him to guide you. Breathe. Listen. Breathe. Listen. Breathe. Let God show you how to lead your family. I wish that I could tell you that all your prayers will be answered but it may not feel like that and I want to encourage you to stick with the listening for God's voice in your heart.

Secondly, continue to be open to the opportunities and people that God puts in front of you. Clear your doubts and fears away so that God has a place to dwell. Whatever He sets in your heart, write it down. Keep a list of possibilities. Let this summer be a time of clarity, simplicity, and purity. Let it be full of joy, life, and beauty.

When your list is extensive, post it where everyone can see it. At this point, I would like to put in a plug for spending a few days at Resurrection. If your children haven't experienced our summer day program, Totus Tuus, this is the year they will learn about the Mysteries of Salvation and the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary. The days are full of songs, skits, prayer, and fun. The other program that is open to all family members is Story in the Park on 3 Mondays in July (10th, 24th, and 31st). We meet in Zenk Hall at 6:30pm and walk to the park area for storytelling, games, and sharing facts about some saints. In addition to weekend Mass, try a daily Mass at 8:30am or prayerfully walk the labyrinth or spend an hour with Jesus in Fr. Winkels Chapel or stop by the office to see what I'm planning for next year. Pray about all these things. Invest in your family spiritually this summer. Let the Holy Spirit be your guide.
