Weekly Words from The Rock

As we celebrate Father's Day this weekend, I wish all fathers our thanks and prayers. Similar to Mother's Day, I would like to provide the prayer for the Blessing of Fathers on Father's Day found in the [Book of Blessings](#) (page 732).

God our Father, in your wisdom and love you made all things. Bless these men, that they may be strengthened as Christian fathers. Let the example of their faith and love shine forth. Grant that we, their sons and daughters, may honor them always with a spirit of profound respect. Grant this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Question for the Week

In February 1993, Karl Keating, in the periodical [This Rock](#), composed a quiz entitled "The World's Toughest Catholic Quiz." Trust me, it is difficult. Over the course of the next weeks we will look at certain questions from the quiz. Last week, I provided two questions for you to think about and see if you could come up with the correct answer. Here are the questions and answers.

Question: Contraception is

- a. Permissible only to married couples with the permission of their parish priest and under extenuating circumstances.
- b. May never be used by married couples.
- c. Permissible if the husband and wife, after honest prayer, conclude it is right for them and do not use it selfishly.
- d. Permissible only if pregnancy likely would put the wife's health in danger or if the couple is unable to support a large family.
- e. None of the above.

Answer:

- a. Wrong, because a priest cannot give permission to anyone to engage in any sinful act.
- b. Correct, as explained in Pope Paul VI's encyclical *Humanae Vitae*. It is immaterial that most Catholics don't practice what the Church always has

preached. Truth is not determined by a majority vote.

- c. Wrong, because this is a cop-out. Contraception is always immoral and does not become moral just because some couples agree not to use it "selfishly." Do bank heists become moral if the thieves agree to distribute the proceeds not to themselves but to the poor?
- d. Wrong, because a good motive cannot make an evil act good. If there is a problem with the wife's health or the family's pocketbook, the couple should consider natural family planning which can be used morally because it does not subvert the requisite openness to new life.
- e. Wrong, because b. is correct.

Question: The sacrament of confession

- a. Must be received before receiving Communion by anyone guilty of a mortal sin.
- b. Is superfluous if you privately and sincerely confess your sins to God.
- c. Must be received by all Catholic adults at least once a year. (This is one of the six precepts of the Church).
- d. Was done away with by Vatican II, except in cases of the three sins which "cry out to God for vengeance": murder, adultery, and sexism.
- e. None of the above.

Answer:

- a. Correct, because no one in a state of mortal sin may take communion. Even a person who has reconciled with God by an act of perfect contrition still must confess the sin sacramentally before receiving Communion.
- b. Wrong, because this would imply Jesus set up a superfluous sacrament – confession – and Jesus never did anything superfluously. See John 20:22-23.
- c. Wrong, because this is not one of the six precepts of the Church, for the simple reason that you need to go to confession only if you commit a mortal sin, though it is good to go frequently even if you commit only venial sins.
- d. Wrong, because this is another nonsense answer. The word "sexism" didn't even exist prior to Vatican II.
- e. Wrong, because a. is correct.

Here are two more for you to think about in the week ahead.

Question: Purgatory is

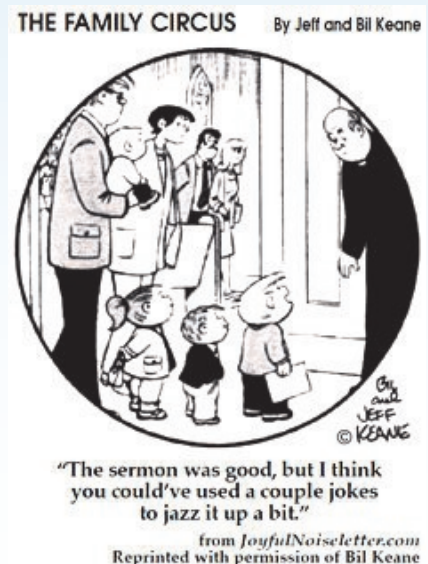
- a. A state of natural happiness where the souls of unbaptized infants and of morally good non-Christians will wait until they are judged on the Last Day.
- b. A state of mild punishment for people who were not bad enough to go to hell and who were not good enough to go to heaven.
- c. A state of purification for people who die in the state of grace but do not die with complete love of God.
- d. A temporary state where sincere people who do not die in the state of grace get a second chance to do good and thus avoid going to hell.
- e. None of the above.

Question: An annulment is

- a. The canon law equivalent of a divorce under the civil law.
- b. A Church-authorized dissolution of a marriage that has failed through the infidelity of one of the spouses.
- c. A declaration that no valid marriage existed in the first place, even if there are children born during the relationship.
- d. A declaration that children born in a failed marriage are not illegitimate.
- e. None of the above.

In working through these questions, please take your time. Remember they are tricky, very tricky. We will see how you did next week.

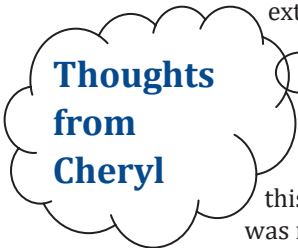


God's blessings! Father Schuster

Liturgy Notes from Joann

Eucharistic Procession

This Sunday we invite you to participate in a Eucharistic Procession after the 11:30 AM Mass. In a Eucharistic Procession – the Blessed Sacrament – the body and blood, soul and divinity of Christ, present in the consecrated host, is placed in a monstrance and carried in procession. A picture of our monstrance is on the right.

A monstrance is a sacred vessel used for the exposition and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, as well as solemn Benediction. The name comes from the Latin “monstrare” which means “to show.” Its primary purpose is to hold the Blessed Sacrament in such a way that it may be viewed and adored by the faithful. The glass enclosure in the center of the monstrance is called the “luna”. It is often surrounded by rays or other decorations portraying in a visible and artistic form the meaning of the spiritual graces conferred by the Holy Eucharist on those who believe, adore and participate.



The monstrance is carried by the presider (priest or deacon) in the procession under a canopy. The canopy serves two purposes: to protect the Blessed Sacrament during the procession and to create a “sacred space”. The canopy is carried by four people with poles.



The Eucharistic Procession forms directly from the Mass. After everyone has received Communion, the monstrance with the Blessed Sacrament is placed on the altar. The presider incenses the monstrance and then carries the monstrance out of the Church where he meets the people with the canopy and then processes into the neighborhood. The procession begins and ends at the Church, stopping along the way at different “altars” where we sing and pray for the world, our community and our families. The final altar is the one here in Church, where the presider gives the final Benediction.

The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life. A Eucharistic Procession is a wonderful witness to our belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist and to the mission that each and every one of us receives every time we leave the Eucharistic celebration – to take Christ into the world.
